Lord of the Flies, a 1954 novel by William Golding, has been banned in schools for years and is often challenged. According to the American Library Association, this is the eighth most commonly banned and contested book in the country. Parents, school administrators and other critics condemned the language and violence in the novel. Intimidation rages throughout the book, indeed, it is one of the main storylines. Many people also think that the book promotes the ideology of slavery, which they note is the wrong signal to teach children. In Lord of the Flies, a plane crash during a wartime evacuation leaves a group of high school boys stranded on the island. The plot may seem simple, but the story slowly degenerates into the wild survival of the fittest fairy tale, with boys cruelty, hunting and even killing some of their own. The overall theme of the book has led to many problems and outright bans over the years. The book was challenged at Owen High School in North Carolina in 1981, for example, because it was demoralized because it meant that a person is little more than an animal, according to the Los Angeles Times. The novel was challenged in Olney, Texas, by the Independent School District in 1984 because of excessive violence and bad language, the ALA states. The association also notes that the book was challenged at Waterloo, Iowa schools in 1992 because of profanity, lurid passages about sex, and defamatory statements for minorities, God, women and the disabled. Later versions of Lord of the Flies changed some of the language in the book, but the novel initially used racist terms, especially when it comes to black people. The Committee of the Toronto, Canada Board of Education ruled on June 23, 1988, that the novel was racist and recommended that it be removed from all schools after parents objected to the use of a book of racial profanity, stating that the novel denigrated black people, according to the ALA. The main theme of the novel is that human nature is cruel and that there is no hope for redemption for humanity. The last page of the novel includes this line: Ralph (the original leader of a group of boys) wept to the end of innocence, the darkness of a man's heart, and fall in the air of a true, wise friend named Piggy. Piggy was one of the characters killed in the book. Many school districts believe in violent books and demoralizing scenes to be too much for young audiences to handle, according to enotes. Despite attempts to ban the book, Lord of the Flies remains popular. In 2013, the first edition signed by the author, even sold for almost 20,000 dollars. For girls, there's the latest crop of Disney movies and a few gems like Sisterhood Travel Pants, Harriet Spy, and my favorite, Coraline - but it's all for a specific audience of pre-teens and girls. There is an absolute shortage of films about girls who are adults.
